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Friends and Neighbors,

Je have weathered a storm or two in the last few f V years, to say the least. While fiscal years 2020 and 2021 brought the COVID-19 pandemic, fiscal year 2022 was double the challenge. We continued seeing positive COVID-19 cases, extended closures of nursing home wings, increased wage pressures and an immense lack of staff. Despite the higher costs of labor and lower revenue due to a decreased census primarily in the nursing home, we were able to meet our financial bond covenants at year end thanks to the qualifications for the Employee Retention Credits under the Cares Act offered by the federal government. As you'll see in this report, fiscal year 2022 has been a year of tremendous challenges throughout the first 6 months, followed by a rebound in the last 6 months. We continue to move forward with positive results into the future. As we navigate the challenges set forth, we continue to keep a keen eye on what matters most: our residents, families, and staff.

In fiscal year 2022, we faced the worst staffing challenges we have ever seen as a community. To address this national labor phenomenon, Immanuel created a new position – a Talent Acquisition Specialist, to help fill open positions, coordinate employing agency nursing staff, and look at new ways to make job seekers from near and far aware of our fantastic community.

While facing the massive labor challenges, our culture of the Immanuel Spirit remained intact as evidenced by our receiving national recognition as a designated Great Place to Work, an award which is based on the survey of our staff. We were also chosen as the Best of Flathead by the readers of the Daily Inter Lake. This is the 4th year in a row to have received this recognition! This year Immanuel's extraordinary efforts toward recruitment and retention have positioned us to not only survive but to thrive.

One example of the results of our extraordinary efforts is the launch of a new childcare learning center called "Growing Roots Early Learning Center." This center is designed to provide quality affordable childcare for our staff as well as the staff from other Flathead Valley businesses. It will serve children 0-5 years of age Monday through Friday 6 am - 6 pm. With dollars awarded to Immanuel in the form of a nearly \$900,000 grant through the American Rescue Plans Act (ARPA), we plan to open our new Center in the summer of 2023.

Immanuel Lutheran Communities is also thriving through our launching of the Immanuel at Home service program. Through a nearly \$700,000 grant awarded to Immanuel and coordinated by the Lutheran Services of America (LSA), we are planning to expand our services to older adults beyond our Immanuel campus throughout the Flathead Valley. We plan to launch Immanuel at Home in early 2023 and are so grateful for the support of LSA.

Stay tuned for more beautiful Immanuel as we continue to build 2 more Cottages (total of 6) for independent living, as well as embark on a new project to bring even more distinctive independent living apartment residences for older adults to our Immanuel campus.

Truly exciting things are happening at Immanuel, and I'm so proud of the dedicated team, supportive donors and families, our volunteers, and amazing residents as well as our well-educated Board of Directors who always step up to support Immanuel's mission and vision.

As we look into the future, leadership, innovation, and excellence are at the forefront. We are at such an exciting time in Immanuel's story, and I can't wait to see how we continue to serve our resident population and beyond in the next 65 years!

From all of us at Immanuel, thank you for your continued support of our community.






YEAR IN REVIEW

Immanuel is continually innovating, adapting, and expanding our reach to bring whole-person wellness and a dynamic living experience to older adults, whether they live near or far, at home or on our campus. Aging is a new stage of opportunities, and the possibilities are endless with Immanuel.



Immanuel Living is a subsidiary member of Immanuel Lutheran Communities and provides development and management services in partnership with other providers and developers in Montana and the region. Together with our partners, we provide a full range of quality financial, consulting, marketing, and management services to senior housing developments. Each community is built from scratch and is unique. We focus on the whole person and what makes each individual special. Our success results from a clear focus on excellence. With Immanuel Living, the sky is the limit. We're excited to bring more senior living opportunities to the Montana market and beyond to continue meeting a huge need.

Growing Roots Early Learning Center–Immanuel Lutheran Communities was awarded a grant through the Child Care Innovation and Infrastructure Grant under the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) administered by the state totaling nearly \$900,000. These funds will support a childcare initiative by Immanuel to support staffing challenges presented by the lack of childcare availability in the Flathead Valley.



Immanuel At Home

Immanuel Lutheran Communities is excited to see the Immanuel at Home program come to fruition after years of planning and research. Nationally, the number of older adults is growing rapidly. It is clear that we cannot build retirement communities fast enough to meet demand. We also know that there are many older adults who either cannot afford or choose not to move into a community such as Immanuel. Immanuel Lutheran Communities was awarded a grant through the Lutheran Services of America for \$700,000 over 3 years to launch this new service to older adults who live in the Flathead Valley.

Immanuel at Home is a program that makes available services and technology in the home with the goal of members residing in their homes as long as they choose. These supports will include a personal concierge, 24-hour nurse support line, remote safety/health monitoring, transportation, dining, technology designed to facilitate social interactions, and other amenities including complete access to the Immanuel campus for social, spiritual and educational events. We anticipate this program to launch in early 2023.





STRATEGIC DEVELOPMENT

The Cottages at Buffalo Hill - Phase II

The second phase of our Cottages at Buffalo Hill came to market in mid-2022 offering two new residential living patio homes ranging in size from 1,300 to 1,580 square-feet. These homes include modern-design features such as a covered front porch, fireplace, full-size washer and dryer, and granite counter tops. These spacious two-bedroom, two-bath floorplans include attached garages and fenced yards. There are no stairs to climb to enter either the front door or attached garage. The Cottages offer access to all campus amenities and services to enhance residents' everyday style of living.

It has been an amazing year in the Immanuel Foundation. Although our residents and employees continued to battle lingering challenges from COVID and staffing shortages, our donors rose above and made a significant difference for our older adults. Our donors know that the older adults we serve are precious community resources, and they held fast to our mission to provide safe homes in vibrant communities for Montana's seniors in need.

While some nursing homes across the state were forced to close their doors, our church partners, community members, corporate sponsors and donors helped us to raise \$419,000 to upgrade the common areas in the Skilled Care Center where 60% of residents are Medicaid, low-income qualified. These dedicated donors also helped to provide additional employee support by donating to our various employee funds, and they helped to fund our Chaplaincy program which benefits residents, employees and the greater community.

The Foundation's overhead and administrative costs are paid by Immanuel Lutheran Communities, so every dollar our donors contribute directly impacts the lives of our older adults.

GREATEST NEEDS FUND

56% \$240,854

Many times donors contribute to our **Greatest Needs Fund**. As our community's needs continue to evolve, these generous gifts allow us to invest in our community in a flexible, impactful way that addresses a broad range of critical, unexpected needs.



EMPLOYEES

Employees are highly valued, and the Foundation raises money to support them through an emergency Christ Care Fund, an Employee Development/Scholarship Fund and Holiday Appreciation Funds. We are so thankful to our employees for their dedication to our residents, and these funds help us to support their efforts.



SENIORS IN NEED FUND

The **Seniors in Need Fund** directly supports the 60% of the Immanuel Skilled Care Center residents who are Medicaid qualified. They have limited means and the coverage from Medicaid doesn't cover the full cost of their care. This fund helps Immanuel continue to provide them with safe, vibrant homes.



CAMPUS ENHANCEMENT

6.8% \$29,318

We know that in order for our residents to have a safe and comfortable place to live, we need to update our infrastructure periodically. The **Campus Enhancement Fund** was created to help. These generous donations are helping us to upgrade common areas in the Skilled Care Center. We are currently upgrading the Heat Recovery Ventilation system, handrails, paint, lighting, flooring and more.



CHAPLAINCY PROGRAM

5.9% \$25,365

Our **Chaplaincy Program** helps Immanuel Lutheran Communities employ a full-time pastor who conducts Sunday worship, memorial services, holiday and other services needed for our residents. Our pastor also supports fellow congregations by serving as a substitute pastor, and he plays a key role in growing our church partnerships throughout Northwest Montana.



MEMORY CARE FUND

Under 1% \$1,603

Our **Memory Care** fund helps us to support residents in our community who have dementia or Alzheimer's. These funds are used for programs like our Music and Memory program which can provide emotional and behavioral benefits for these residents.

OTHER

The Immanuel Foundation created the **COVID Fund** to help offset the overwhelming, unexpected costs during these challenging times. These critical funds help to protect our residents and employees as the COVID pandemic continues.

Fulfilling Our Mission

The Immanuel Foundation is committed to supporting residents and employees of Immanuel Lutheran Communities during these challenging times. While some nursing homes across the state have closed due to staffing shortages and insufficient Medicaid reimbursement funds from the state government, we were able to both upgrade our Skilled Care Center common areas and help with the staffing challenges in FY22. This commitment to residents and employees directly impacts our community at large.

Commitment to Residents

Facility Upgrades: The eastern most area of the Immanuel Skilled Care Center was built in 1956 and was in dire need of comprehensive updates. Community support, corporate sponsorships and donor contributions helped us to raise \$419,000 to renovate the common spaces in 2022 and bring the wing up to the same level of finish as the rest of the Immanuel Skilled Care Center and the Retreat. We also updated mechanical systems to ensure that residents have a safe, healthy environment.

Caring for Low-Income Seniors: Over 60% of the residents in the Skilled Care Center are low-income and Medicaid-qualified. Before they came to live at Immanuel, they helped to build our community while working as nurses, teachers, farmers, and more. They may have saved for retirement but now they need 24/7 care due to a medical event such as dementia or a stroke, and they have exhausted their resources paying for the care they need. Although the state of Montana provides a Medicaid reimbursement, the reimbursement does not cover the full cost of their care. Donor support helps to ensure that Immanuel Lutheran Communities is able to continue to provide safe homes in vibrant communities to seniors at all income levels.

Supporting Employee Recruitment and Retention:

Recruitment: The workforce shortage continues to challenge industries across the nation, and the Immanuel Foundation has stepped up to help Immanuel Lutheran Communities address this growing need. We applied for grants from outside funding sources to help with employee recruitment and retention.

Retention: The Immanuel Foundation also raised funds to directly support our employees in a number of ways. We continued to grow our Christ Care Fund to help employees in emergency situations. We awarded over \$24,000 in scholarships to help 20 employees further their education, and we awarded over \$90,000 to honor our hourly workers during the holiday season. Our employees are the secret to our success, and we strive to provide ongoing support as they lovingly care for our residents.


